# 16 <u>Introduction of Speaker</u>:-

**David French** 

Our guest speaker was Helen Dornom. She has recently retired from the Australian Milk Board. She spoke on the milk industry for both the Australian and export markets

Helen spoke of the value to the economy that the dairy industry bought. How it was a strong supporter of regional communities. It kept schools in regional areas as well as doctors.

The Australian Dietary guidelines recommend four and a half serves /day of dairy. One serve being 300ml of calcium. Most of us are not getting enough.

Research shows that if dairy is adequate the incidence of stroke and heart disease is lowered. The low percentage of fat in milk is not linked to weight gain.

The dairy industry is the third largest rural industry in Australia. It counts for thirty percent of our exports. Victoria is the largest producer of milk.

There are 150+ processors of milk. Butter, cheese, drinking milk, yoghurt, whole milk products. Butter, yoghurt, cheese and milk being the major bought products.

Challenges facing the industry include competition from plant based 'milks'. Controversy exists over why they are allowed to call themselves milk.

Why dairy? If the number of serves of dairy/day was increased in nursing homes falls and therefore admissions to hospital due to hip fractures would be reduced.

A most informative and interesting talk.
