# Annual Report 2015 - 2016

#### Introduction

This is the thirteenth Annual Report of the Probus Club of Templestowe Valley (Combined) Inc.

#### What is Probus?

The Probus movement had its genesis in two ancestors – both in the UK and both established by Rotary Clubs. The first was formed in 1965 and was known as the Campus Club – its name was derived from the area of the town in which it was conceived – the Campus. The second was formed by the Rotary Club of Caterham in 1966 and was named the Probus Club for the "PRO" in professional and the "BUS" in business and which also made up the Latin word from which "PROBITY" is derived.

Both were formed to meet the need for companionship of their peers and mental stimulation for retired business and professional men. Today there are Clubs for male, female and combined gender.

The first Club in Rotary's South Pacific area was the Probus Club of Kapiti Coast, New Zealand in 1974. The first Club in Australia was the Probus Club of Hunter's Hill, NSW in 1976.

Today Probus is a world-wide movement in twenty three countries with Probus South Pacific having some 50% of the world number of Probus Clubs.

#### **Probus South Pacific Limited**

What is now known as PSPL was formed in 1981 in Sydney when five Rotarians, all of whom had been involved in the formation of Probus Clubs got together to share their experiences. They recommended the provision of an information service to Rotary Clubs throughout the region. The result was the Probus Information Centre.

At the time of formation it was noted that "It was important however that the Centre would not be a controlling body, or Probus Head Office, but rather a service or information centre."

In 2010 the Board of Probus Centre – South Pacific created a new organisation to replace the Centre. The new organisation is a company limited by guarantee, and Probus South Pacific Ltd. (PSPL) is formed under NSW law. It is a commercial organisation but simultaneously takes for itself the right to control all non-profit Probus Clubs and organisational structures in the South Pacific.

#### MISSION

PSPL is dedicated to promoting the development of friendship, fellowship and the advancement of intellectual interests for active retirees through Probus Clubs in the South Pacific area.

#### VISION

The vision of PSPL is to co-ordinate the growth, development and ongoing support for Probus Clubs, as the most widely recognised organisation for active retirees, in fostering the true spirit of Probus – friendship, fellowship and fun.

Currently we have 150 Club Members, including two Life Members, Kerry McInerney and Doug Hayne. It is 12 years since our Club had its inaugural meeting on June 12, 2003,under the guidance of Manningham Rotarians, Ken Murray and Max Didier, when 62 Foundation Members signed up in the hall at the Ted Ajani Reserve.

The Club was incorporated in 2004 and Doug Hayne was appointed the first Public Officer. Today this position is held by the Club Secretary.

By being incorporated, any litigation needs to be directed to the incorporated body and cannot be directed to individual members.

The Club meetings are held on the second Monday of every month throughout the year and commence at 9.45am in the Ajani Centre, 284 Thompsons Road, Lower Templestowe, 3107.

#### Club Insurance

PSPL provides an universal insurance cover for Members and third parties attending official and approved Club events. Each Club is levied an annual fee to cover this insurance. The PSPL annual fee has increased for 2016, to \$12.25 per Member, however our Member's Annual Club Fees will remain the same for 2016.

#### Manningham Probus Interest Group.

There are over 20 Clubs in the Municipality of Manningham and these have formed the Manningham Probus Interest Group. Two delegates from each of the Manningham Clubs are invited to attend twice yearly meetings of the Group (usually held in March and October) where items of mutual interest are discussed and information on speakers and outings exchanged. An Information Day is also organised in April for any interested Members. This day can be a valuable resource for Committee Members.

#### Probus Club of Templestowe Valley (Combined) Inc. Management Committee Meetings

These meetings are held monthly at 2pm on the second Monday of the month in a Committee member's home.

PSPL REPORT Ellen Boyd

I was privileged to be asked by the President, Wendy Fishley to continue the outstanding work of Craig Lukeman to ensure our Club was kept abreast of the activities of PSPL.

I have received from Anne all Craig's papers in relation to the work he was doing to keep us informed of the issues arising with PSPL. I have compiled all the information accumulated and will continue to report on his behalf.

As Craig reported, the PSPL Reform Group have highlighted major governance issues arising from the excessive expenditure by PSPL and the lack of communication with the District Rotary representative to clarify our concerns.

Amongst the papers there are the newsletters of Probus New Zealand Inc. who report a membership of 261 Clubs as at 3 March 2015. This represents 62% of all Clubs in New Zealand who have separated from PSPL Australia and formed their own Incorporated body.

This figure increases dramatically each month and I will try to continue our links with New Zealand.

In the PNZI newsletter dated 1 December 2014, the Chairman Ross Gurney states:

PSPL seems to be trying to move Probus Community towards the commercial user-pays end of the spectrum. If that is the case, what are the goods and services that we as users are paying for?

Are they value for money?

He goes on to say:

Recalling that Probus from the outset has had a rule to not be engaged in fund-raising activities, did not pay capitation to anyone, and organised their own insurance, why is there such secrecy about the PSPL Board meetings?

I note from the July 2015 Rotary District 9810 Probus Newsletter distributed to our Committee, the PSPL Annual General Meeting was held on 11 June 2015. I requested that our Committee apply for a copy of the Annual Financial Reports 2014 and 2015 which I have now received.

I also note from the District Newsletter, our Rotary District 9810 Probus Chair, Robert Renshaw has been appointed a Director on the Board of PSPL and represents Victoria & Tasmania. I do not recall any nomination or election process as our representative.

I am deeply disturbed by Robert's comment in the third and fourth paragraph of the Newsletter where he refers to Rotary Clubs to engage more with Probus, he further states:

" the benefit is a two way street where you may be able to assist the Rotary Club in some of their fund raising efforts as individuals, and also attract some of their members nearing retirement".

This is not the original charter of Probus Clubs to support Rotary and disturbing that 'our Vic/Tas representative believes this to be the new direction.

I have been advised that a Probus Club in another District has requested their Rotary/ Probus Chair to address the Management Committee. Robert Renshaw has been invited to address our Management Committee in the past but did not respond.

I will try to keep you informed to the best of my ability and in doing so pay our respect to the wonderful work Craig did for our Club.

## Treasurer's Annual Report for Year Ended 31 January 2016

Our balance of Club Funds at the start of this financial year was \$3,071. This year's Club income was \$6,048 and our expenditure was \$5,329, leaving a balance of \$3,790 in Club Funds.

The deposits held for Activities at 1 February 2015 were \$7,542. The Activities income for the year amounted to \$56,677 and the expenditure was \$56,584 leaving a balance of \$7,636 held for Activities at the end of the financial year. The income and expenditure figures only represent funds that have gone through the club's accounts.

The club spent \$82- on glass water jugs and storage tubs which were used at the Christmas lunch and will now be available for future functions. These items have been added to the clubs assets register.

Some activities and event's income and expenditure is understated (as indicated on the attached report) owning to the fact not all funds were handled in line with the club's 'Tours & Refund Policy' i.e. passed through the club's accounts. This also resulted in the funds not being covered by the Probus insurance policy. This matter is a concern for myself and the some of the management committee and will hopefully be addressed when the 'Tours & Refund Policy' is reviewed shortly.

The financial records have been progressively audited by Kerry McInerney and his report is attached to my reports. His time and expertise in undertaking this audit is appreciated and I thank him on behalf of the club.
